We just completed our third week of this November Neurosurgery Mission and are pleased to report that our patients who have had pituitary tumor resections via the transphenoidal approach in Liberia are steadily recovering. Their return for dressing changes and evaluations are ongoing. These surgeries were skillfully conducted by our international neurosurgery team led by Dr. Femi Bankole (Nigeria) and Dr. Alvin Nah Doe (Liberia.)

SIX-YEAR-OLD PROSPER

Six-year-old Prosper was discovered three years ago by Ingo Neufeld, KBNF photographer, and Aaron Fedora, KBNF Board Director, during a neurosurgery mission. While walking on the grounds at JFK Memorial Hospital,


they noticed a little boy with his mother, waiting to be seen by our team. Little Prosper had a serious frontal cranial defect, causing his brain to protrude. Immediately, they embraced the seriousness of his situation and fast-tracked him for evaluation and surgery. The first stage of his surgery was followed, eight months later, by a shunt insertion and now precious Prosper has had his final surgery repair.

The JFK Hospital elevators shutdown just prior to our arrival. No elevators meant that all of our team, patients and families had to climb nine sets of stairs to get to surgery. (I counted them!) Thankfully, surgeries were conducted on the 4th floor and our patients were recovered on the same floor throughout their stay. When vision is impaired, however, it's quite daunting to descend that many stairs. It could take a small village to ensure a patient's safe departure!



Our KBNF Hope City presentation on Saturday evening was met with enthusiasm by Deputy Ministers of State, the Chief Executive Officer of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Hospital and JFK"S Chief Medical Officer, along with members of the KBNF family. I shared the story of how this vision got started.

I am grateful to report that Liberian national leaders are rising up to support KBNF's urgent needs. Honorable Sekou Dukuly, Chair of the National Port Authority, has graciously accepted paying for the transport of a functional C-Arm from Sweden and a neuro-microscope from Finland. This will enable Dr. Nah Doe and the KBNF neurosurgery team to resume spinal surgeries of all descriptions, including fusions, as well as complex craniotomies.
